The Psalms, which is divided into five books, were written by various authors over the span of hundreds of years. David wrote roughly half of them as a means of worship, some as songs of praise and others as prayers of lament. Some of the most well-known verses in all of Scripture come from the Psalms and many are prophetic in nature as seen later in the New Testament. What stands out most is the passion and the honesty from its authors, leading us by example in how to approach the throne of God from the deep recesses of the heart.
